"The spread of coronavirus reveals what we wonder about ourselves today are we worth saving, and at what cost?" (& who is "we"?)

Ask a Different Question: Reclaiming autonomy of action (or: "The Worst Virus Ever... Authority...")

20 March 2020

"How do we target the way power is concentrating and restructuring itself around us? What interests are poised to "win" at the virus and how do we undermine them (think investment opportunities, but also new laws and increased powers). What infrastructure of control is being put in place? Who are the profiteers and how can we hurt them? How do we prepare for what comes next and plan for the window of possibility that might exist in between the worst of the virus and a return to economic normalcy?

Developing our own read on the situation, along with our own goals and practices, is not a small job. It will take the exchange of texts, experiments in action, and communication about the results. It will take broadening our sense of inside-outside to include enough people to be able to organize. It will involve still acting in the public space and refusing to retreat to online space. Combined with measures to deal with the virus, the intense fear and pressure to conform coming from many who would normally be our allies makes even finding space to discuss the crises on different terms a challenge. But if we actually want to challenge the ability of the powerful to shape the response to the virus for their own interests, we need to **start by taking back the ability to ask our own questions.**

Conditions are different everywhere, but all states are watching each other and following each others' lead, and we would do well to look to anarchists in other places dealing with conditions that may soon become our own."

If the mobilisation unfolds as a war against the population, it is because its sole objective is to save the algorithm of life, which, of course, has nothing to do with our personal and irreducible lives, which matter little.

Dark and paroxysmal life, that which is incalculable in its ambivalence, escapes the algorithm."

socialists must take the next step and, with the health care and pharmaceutical industries as immediate targets, advocate social ownership and the democratization of economic power. In addressing the pandemic, socialists should find every occasion to remind others of the urgency of international solidarism. Concretely we need to agitate our progressive friends and their political idols to demand a massive scaling up of the production of test kits, protective supplies, and lifeline drugs for free distribution to poor countries. It's up to us to ensure that Medicare for All becomes foreign as well as domestic policy."

Politics in times of catastrophe

20 March 2020

The present catastrophe is not centrally the virus, but a system of social relations that transforms nature – and can only see value in nature as transformed – into capital, into commodities.

As regional economies slow, with parallel and exponential effects at the global level, a sort of "rewilding" begins to occur; new or more vigorous life shows itself, where before there was only statistical and unseen death.

increasingly large numbers of people, whole communities, are expendable. Mike Davis reminds us that it is the working poor, the colonised, the marginalised, who are cut down in plagues.

COVID-19, as a catastrophe, offers lessons for those able or desirous to learn: that we are all equal in our common fragility, that our creativity, ways of being in the world, are inescapably collective, that this collective is in no way exclusively human, and that human and natural communities flourish when a free equality flourishes as well.

let the present "reversal" of things become a true reversal:

choose for the practices of collective mutual aid.

Not to mention domestic violence. Forced quarantine and isolation for weeks at home run the risk of being a real-time bomb for cases of domestic violence, as the Chinese case shows . For some, staying home sounds more like a threat than comfort."

The vital importance of social self-organization

17 March 2020

The labour movement must fight for the cessation of all unnecessary production and transport, to ensure that the maximum health safety conditions are respected in the essential workplaces, and that workers' incomes and contracts be fully maintained in the event of total or partial unemployment.

Local organizations have an essential role to play on many levels. ... By combating racism, xenophobia, LGBT+phobia they can make sure that precarious, migrant, undocumented and discriminated minorities are not excluded from the protections to which they are entitled. They can help women for whom confinement means a deadly lock-up with a violent spouse. They can ensure that daily gestures of "social distancing" are respected.

Many instances of grassroots organization at the level of a neighbourhood, a block of flats, with those proposing to help and those needing help (elderly, disabled, in quarantine) making contact, often for the first time, exist in different countries,

Social movements must be able to rely on independent medical and scientific expertise to know which measures are effective and indispensable, and encourage international exchange. Doctors and researchers must engage with them.

Finally, the self-activity of the social movement is an irreplaceable democratic guarantee. The authoritarianism of the powers can be reinforced in times of health emergencies, in the name of efficiency. The broadest possible unitary mobilization front must be opposed to this dominant trend.

Epidemiologist's Solutions for The End the Crisis

"1. Find out if the distribution of virus like an iceberg, or a pyramid

2. Make a treatment that works, a vaccine or antiviral.

3. (make sure) large numbers of people—in particular nurses, home health care providers, doctors, policemen, firemen, and teachers who have had the disease—are immune; **and** we have tested them to know that they are not infectious any longer. And we have a system that identifies them, either a concert wristband or a card with their photograph and some kind of a stamp on it. Then we can be comfortable sending our children back to school, because we know the teacher is not infectious."

The Invention of an Epidemic

For balance, not "only" anarchists but the "philosophers" too have a critical view of the "plague":

" in a perverse vicious circle, the limitations of freedom imposed by governments are accepted in the name of a desire for safety that was created by the same governments that are now intervening to satisfy it."

At the extreme of non-pathological relations, the chloroplasts in plant cells and the mitochondria in the cells of our bodies are ancient, well-settled cohabitations between different species. Above all, viruses and bacteria do not "intend" to kill their host, for it is not always in their "interest" to destroy that through which alone they could survive. In the long term—of millions of years of nature's time—"everything learns to live with each other", or at least obtain equilibria with one another for long periods.

everything can be thought in the model of the "pharmakon" (both poison and cure) if we take nature's time.

unlike nature's time, humans are concerned with this moment, which must be led to the next moment with the feeling that we are the forsaken: those who are cursed to ask after "the why" of their being but without having the means to ask it. "

We love, age, grow, lose, grieve. But when we get through it, together, then there's grace, intimacy, revelation, meaning, understanding, closeness. All the things we cherish and treasure so in moments like these, when the superficial is excised away. The upside of a world like the one I've described isn't just that it's healthier, saner, more prosperous, fairer. But also that it's fuller of meaning, happiness, purpose, truth, gentleness, love."

Binary division: Domesticated vs Disposable

"at least two new kinds of subjectivity have already begun to take shape... On the one hand, we have the domesticated/connected subject, who in being confined to their home is pushed to invent new ways to reconnect to and participate in a virtualized economy. On the other hand, we have the mobile/disposable subject that serves as the circulatory system of the pandemic, a subject that becomes increasingly vulnerable and precarious as it is compelled to move at ever greater velocities. In order for domesticated/connected subjects to materially sustain themselves, they must be coupled with the mobile/disposable subject that fulfills the minimum material needs of society while ensuring the social possibility of isolated yet networked domestic life."
